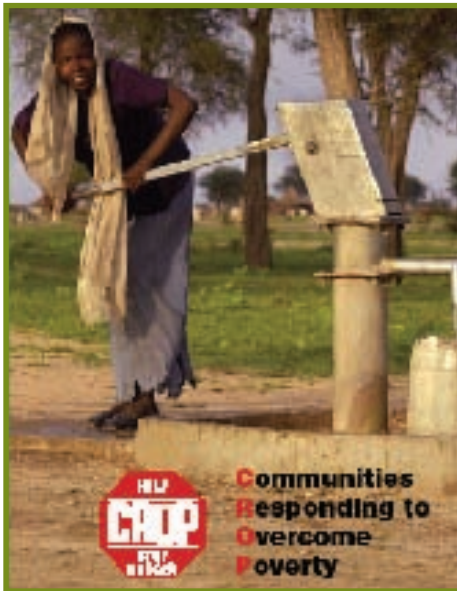

Redder's Redactions: "Healthy vs. Unhealthy"

At the second meeting of the Search Team that I attended, I asked the group to amuse me with their taking a short little test. Taking tests was not why they were there, of course, so there was a little underlying opposition to doing so. Taking it proved to be most interesting – even fun. For those who have opened eyes, it may have been most revealing.

The "Church Readiness Inventory" is designed to provide a guide to discover the level of readiness of a church to move to greatness. Thousands of churches across America and Canada have taken this test and most, after having been surprised often at the results, have settled on the results being a quite accurate picture of themselves. The quiz measures many things, but, overall, it may be said to measure "church health." Is this church, or any particular church, a healthy church or an unhealthy church?

At this point I won't tell you the results of that one taking of the inventory. But I want to use it as a springboard to lay before you a few of the acknowledged characteristics of healthy churches versus unhealthy congregations. If you desire Biblical references for such distinctions, I have included references from Acts. I also will list only a few differing distinctives, not all.

Healthy church – Emphasis on grace (15.1-36)
Unhealthy church – Emphasis on works-righteousness

Healthy church – Based on the Bible (2.42)
Unhealthy church – Based on tradition

Healthy church – Diversity is encouraged (2.9-11) and there is respect for individual beliefs and cultural differences
Unhealthy church – conformity is prized, and individual beliefs and cultural differences are devalued

Healthy church – Prayer is a priority (4.23-31)
Unhealthy church – Prayer is talked about but not practiced

Healthy church – Repentance is stressed (3.19)
Unhealthy church – Repentance is whispered

Healthy church – Members trust other members and leaders (5.1-11)

Unhealthy church – Mistrust is evidence by an undercurrent of unexpressed hostility

Healthy church – Members feel empowered (4.31) and share power with one another

Unhealthy church – Members or leaders use power and control over others

Healthy church – Organizational structure is functional and flexible (6.1-7) and a gift-based ministry is in place

Unhealthy church – Organizational structure is inflexible and dysfunctional with haphazard ministry

Healthy church – Cohesion is high; there is a close emotional bond among members – members share with each other (2.44-45)

Unhealthy church – Division exists – people feel distant from one another – there is a lack of caring and empathy

Healthy church – Loving relationships permeate every aspect of the church (20.36-38)

Unhealthy church – Members are distant from each other

The contrast goes on for many more distinctives, but these few examples will suffice to portray the difference between a healthy congregation and an unhealthy one. From the perspective of an outside observer, but as well often from an "inside" observer with a hidden agenda, all this may be easily not acknowledged or rashly dismissed. How would you rate your church?

If we identified the strengths of Coopersville Reformed, would you be eager to build on them? As well, identifying weaknesses deserves measures to acknowledge them and deal with them. That great and glorious day is going to come when Jesus will be presented with his beautiful bride, the church, and only then will we all be without blemish. However, until that time we pray and rely on Christ's Word and Spirit to help us strive to be all the Lord wants us to be as His church today. What do you think – healthy or unhealthy?

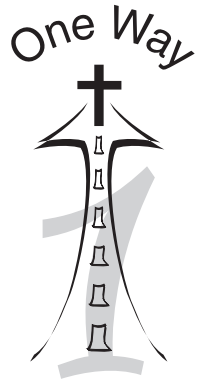

There were 10 youth groups vying for 6 positions. We got in, with the dates of July 20-27. Our first fundraiser will be the Pig Roast/Auction on November 8.

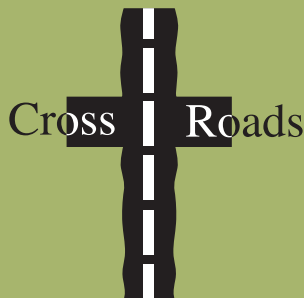
Ministry Need...Help!
